Internet Addresses

- Every host computer on the net has an IP address:
 - IPv4 (32 bits)/IPv6(128 bits)
 - IANA allocates blocks of addresses to RIRs
 - RIRs (ARIN, RIPE, APNIC, LANIC, AfriNIC) allocate addresses to LIRs (ISPs)
 - LIRs (ISPs) assign addresses to users


- June 3rd, 1998: The US white paper released:


- September 13, 1998 draft bylaws of ICANN
- October 2, 1998 ICANN submits proposal
- November 10, 1998 NTIA announced reviewing a submission by ICANN on its bylaws
- November 25, 1998 A MoU signed between ICANN and DOC, US
- September 28, 1999 New Registry agreement signed between ICANN and NSI, providing for multiple registrars in .com, .net and .org


RIR System Evolution





- GAC liaison to Board represents GAC interests to best of ability


ICANN multi-stakeholder model










Numbers of Alexa Top 1M Websites that Supports IPv6




IPv6 Status

What do I Need to Apply?

- ✓ Review Applicant Guidebook for details
- ✓ Get strategic third parties involved early
- Attention to additional requirements for geographic, community and IDN applications
- Review deadlines



How Much?

Evaluation fee - US\$ 185,000

- Paid to ICANN
- US \$5,000 which is due upon TAS registration
- Refunds apply in certain cases
- Other fees may apply might not be paid to ICANN


On-going Registry Fees

- US\$ 25,000 annual Registry fee
- Transaction fee US\$ 0.25


These are evaluation and Registry fees only. Consider carefully the costs for running a Registry.


